Legislators Face Vexing Problems as Adjournment Day Draws Near.

PAST WEEK BUSY ONE FOR SOLONS Water Power, Salary Cuts and Prohibition Matters Promise Real Battles.

CHARLESTON, Feb. 21. (AP)—Amusement bill, which popped up in the legislature again this week and was carried over into next week, probably for action of some sort.

Condemned Couple Must Pay With Life for Slaying Brady Paul.

TRIP TO PRISON HOLIDAY TO THEM Mrs. Schroeder Will Be First Woman Electrocutated in State.

ROCKVIEW PRISON, BELLEVILLE, Pa., Feb. 21. (AP)—The doors of the death house clanked shut behind Mrs. Irene Schroeder and W. Glenn Dague tonight, marking for all time their contact with the outside world.

Monday morning, shortly before 10 o'clock, they will be marched to the electric chair, there to expiate the slaying of Corp. Brady Paul, a state highway officer.

Their last hours on earth will be spent in less than a few feet from the instrument the state has set up to legally exact the lives of those condemned for murder.

Last Week Gone They will be unable to see each other from their cells, and prison rules do not permit visitors other than the regular chaplain or other spiritual advisors.

The doomed pair was received at Rockview late this afternoon after a 15-hour trip by automobile from New Castle, where their confinement in the Lawrence county jail had extended to more than a year.

By NEA Service WASHINGTON, Feb. 21.—No man in American history is the subject of quite so many traditional myths and anecdotes as George Washington.

Washington was 19 at the time, and was enjoying a swim in the Rappahannock. The two girls appeared from nowhere and danced with him. Evidently it was not a practical joke, as they took his watch and money from his pockets. Later they were caught, and when it developed that they had "vicious" characters—as the old chroniclers put it—they were whipped and imprisoned.

ADMIRAL DEWEY'S WIDOW EXPIRES AT HOME IN CAPITAL

Passes in Home Where Hero-Husband Died Fourteen Years Ago.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21. (AP)—Within walls of time-worn, low-ceilinged, befitting a half century's social reign in Washington, the 66-year-old widow of Admiral George Dewey died today.

Quietly, after social triumphs supreme, Mrs. Mildred McLean Dewey had lived her last years reading omnivorously, receiving a very few callers, and looking from her stately windows upon the busy city that had come crowding to her very doorway.

Influenza followed by an attack of pneumonia was the cause of her death.

She died in the home where her hero-husband died fourteen years ago, in the home that was a surprise gift from her father, William McLean, publisher, on the occasion of her first marriage during the Grant administration.

Of rich brocades were all its walls and hangings, of rare woods wrought into panelings all its floor, and famous indeed was it as a salon where great met great.

Eventually it became almost a museum of the Spanish-American war, with the rarest of the Dewey relics on display—the sword with which the hero of Manila Bay, an admiral's flag that was one of only three, Farragut and Porter.

He gallantly filled four tiny wine glasses with a simple cordial for the little girls.

Various biographers have remarked that Washington had high temper, which occasionally vented itself in an impassioned manner.

Washington was lavishly entertained in Barbados and when he was home, he was a man of letters.

Senate Asks Secret Files Of Wickersham Committee

SAY REPORT ON SIXTEEN STATES OMITTED FROM DATA SUBMITTED.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21. (AP)—Demand upon the Wickersham commission for more of its prohibition data came today from a senate already loaded with a conflicting mass of testimony.

The senate adopted without debate a resolution by Senator Tydings, Democrat, Maryland, an amendment demanding the commission's reasons for withholding any information as to prohibition enforcement in the other sixteen states and the District of Columbia.

The word had come from commission headquarters that "less than half" the data upon which the prohibition report was based had been submitted to the senate, and several questions were asked.

Meanwhile, a survey of the senate already before the senate disclosed a bewildering variety of reports upon condition in the 32 states touched upon.

Among the states not included in the survey were Michigan, Missouri, and Wisconsin, pictured as provided with a "flood of intoxicants."

Eleven of the states, however, were described as having almost entirely satisfactory enforcement, with liquor available but apparently not being sold.

The most sensational report always described as having been submitted by "liquor has been plentiful" there and listed both the number of saloons and the number of saloons where it was sold.
